



Through the Dominican-Model, we have compiled the largest database of Dominican-American voters in the US, and one of the largest Hispanic voter databases in the nation. We use our data to mobilize our community for state, local, and federal elections and primaries, leading to a significant increase in the voting power of Dominican-Americans at the National level.

VOTER ENGAGEMENT

Our project began with a focus on registering our community to vote and mobilizing them to go out and vote (GOTV). We have achieved and surpassed all our goals by working with a dedicated team of canvassers rooted in the communities where they work. In 2016, we registered over 33,700 voters in New York and 7,500 voters in Rhode Island. DUSA has directly registered over 148,000 voters since its inception.




Events

DUSA conducts voter registration at important community events such as the Dominican Day Parade of the Bronx and Manhattan, community health fairs, job fairs, concerts, and festivals




GET OUT THE VOTE (GOTV)

DUSA organized Get-Out-The-Vote Campaigns for various elections in New York and Rhode Island throughout 2016. This includes elections during the months of November, September, June, April, and February. Our canvassers knocked on over **73,000** Doors and made over **145,000** phone calls to voters. We also sent out more than **104,000** mail notifications with poll site locations to voters all over the course of 2016.

EVERY VOTE COUNTS

In order to ensure that the same individuals we registered were able to cast their vote, we implemented a poll monitoring and voter protection program on election day for each of these elections. The emphasis of this program was to contact voters leaving the poll site on Election Day, and asking if they had any issues casting their vote. If there an issue arose, DUSA poll monitors documented the experience and attempted to help that person. Every Election Day, we have a significant number of people interested in voting, but who had difficulty getting to their poll site due to age or disability. We try to provide these voters with transportation, depending on their location.

JUNE 2016 CONGRESSIONAL PRIMARY IN NY

Dominicanos USA played a critical role in the historic June 28, 2016 New York Congressional primaries. Dominicanos USA (DUSA) successfully embarked on a massive mobilization campaign in the Dominican-American community. These efforts combined large-scale door-to-door, phone, and direct mail outreach. This tremendous effort generated an unprecedented voter turnout from the Dominican American community, who helped send the first ever Dominican-American to congress.


DUSA has registered over *30,000* voters in both the 13th and 15th congressional districts of NY. In the two weeks before the June election we knocked on over *31,000* doors, made *37,000* phone calls, and sent out *51,000* mailers. After doing an analysis of the impact of our voter turnout, we found that in the case of congressional district 13, DUSA voters were a significantly larger portion of the votes cast than the margin of victory between the top two candidates. Also, DUSA voters turned out a higher rate than the general population. This historic event demonstrated that when a community is organized, united and empowered, things can change for the better

YOUNG LEADERS




Since 2015, DUSA has served as a partner in the NYC Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). Through this initiative, we engage a younger demographic and educate this group of students about the civic process and importance of civic engagement.

Our youth service learning program employs youth as young as 14 and adults in their early twenties. Participants do not simply work for DUSA, but also attend educational workshops at DUSA head-quarters in New York and engage guest speakers through dialogue. Not only do we provide employment for these young thinkers, but we also immerse these young leaders of tomorrow in educational workshops that provide them with the necessary skills and knowledge to participate in citizenship engagement. During summer 2016, our team hosted over 110 students. Over the course of six weeks the youth registered over 2,400 voters.

In 2017, we expect to expand our service learning program from summer to a year-long program. In addition, we plan on incorporating more educational workshops and activities such as exhibitions and field trips for participants.

On March 18, 2016, DUSA took part in the second annual Student Voter Registration Day in NYC, in partnership with NYC Votes and the New York Immigration Coalition. DUSA team members presented a Department of Education approved curriculum to students and registered over 500 high school students to vote. We also participated in the fall iteration of this program in October 2016.





DUSA CITIZENSHIP PROGRAM


We launched the DUSA Citizenship Program in August 2016 to enhance the ability of our community to engage civically, by helping eligible legal permanent residents (LPRs) become U.S. citizens. Thus far, we have collected contact information from over 2,200 people interested in becoming U.S. citizens. 52% of those prospects are Dominican and 64% are female.

After being actively engaged in the community for several years and registering citizens to vote, we found ourselves with an unsuspecting issue. Daily, we began to encounter Dominicans interested in registering, yet they could not do so because they were not U.S. citizens and were unaware about the process of how to become naturalized.



EARLY SUCCESS

DUSA Citizenship has organized eight citizenship events since August 2016, including six in New York and two in Rhode Island. At these events we have helped hundreds of legal permanent residents by screening them for eligibility, filling out their forms, and offering free legal services from pro-bono attorneys. This success rate, when looking at the ratio of applications filed, places us in the top tier of organizations, in terms of efficacy. The events have been possible with the help of several volunteer attorneys, and other volunteers.



"Up to date, we have assisted 170 participants at the Citizenship drives, completed 108 N-400, 90 I-912, 3 I-942, 2 N-600 and 3 N-565 applications, in New York only."

HOW IT WORKS

- Our DUSA team identifies and registers eligible legal permanent residents (LPRs)
- We use our "Dominican data model" database to find eligible LPRs within the general population
- After information is collected, LPRs are contacted and go through a prescreening process to determine eligibility
- Once eligibility is established, LPRs attend a free workshop where they 1. receive assistance completing the application and 2. receive free legal review from an attorney or Department of Justice (DOJ) accredited representative.
- We developed our own database using Microsoft Access that allow us to better manage the data collected from the Citizenship program.

PROGRAM WITH A PURPOSE

Made possible by a generous grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, DUSA Citizenship is now engaging this young, dynamic, and fast-growing group of new Americans in the naturalization process. We are making this incredible social change a reality with a unique and innovative model that incorporates the latest tech, best practices from across the country, and a team that understands the Dominican community because they come from it.
